Same Face, New Body

Many people look almost identical from one life to the next. Bone structure, smiles, even signature hand-gestures show up again.



Birth-Marks = Old Scars

Unexplained birthmarks or birth defects can line up with injuries or wounds from a person's previous life story.



Surprise Languages (Xenoglossy)

Built-In Talents & Child Prodigies

Carry-Over Phobias

An unreasoning fear of water, fire, or loud noises can trace back to the way someone died in a former life.

Split Incarnation (Parallel Lives)

Rarely, a soul runs two bodies at once, creating overlapping lifetimes that later cross-reference.
